



Dear friend,

The Open Estonia Foundation has reached an age that permits us to take a look at the past. I am convinced that the approximately 300 million kroons invested into Estonia by George Soros during the nineties has borne more fruit than any other foreign investment ever to reach these shores. This can best be explained by the fact that the money in question has never been directed towards the accomplishment of a single undertaking that could be simply confined to one given time or place, such as a bank, factory or highway. This is because - instead of being directed towards the accomplishment of a single undertaking confined in time and space (such as a bank, factory or road), this money has reached all facets of our existence. A thousand different things have been built thanks to the support provided by George Soros, but they all have one common denominator, that being a civil society. Investing into the construction of Estonian society has paid many returns. At the beginning of the nineties, we spoke of civil society as an indeterminate goal, but by now it has become a matter of adding refinements to a working civil society. This leap has come about in large part thanks to the projects, subsidies and initiatives of the OEF.

The period of transition is drawing to a close in Estonia, our society is no longer weak, with its hand outstretched in anticipation of aid as was the case during the early years of the OEF. New conditions bring with them the renewal of the Foundation. 1999 was a year of reform and changes. From here on, the provision of funding on a "wall-to-wall" basis will be replaced by two or three clearly delineated action programs, the thrust of which shall not be mere making of donations. Above all, ideas and solutions will be proffered. The OEF wishes to actively participate in the task of working out the key issues of Estonia's development, making proposals designed to speed Estonia's arrival into the circle of nations known for their Europeanness - into the group of societies where uniqueness goes hand in hand with innovation and openness. Changes are always difficult, but I'm convinced that due to its experience and its potential, the Foundation will continue in the results-oriented fashion that has become its hallmark in Estonia. It is my hope that we will also be able to continue substantive cooperation with all of the friends and kindred spirits of the Foundation.

If one were to seek one single word that would sum up the ninth year of the work of the Foundation, that word would be "integration". In the interests of social integration, how can we ensure responsible governance, the participation of the people, propagation of tolerance, and the bring the ideas of social equality to life? These were the key issues of the past year for the Foundation.

1999 was also the year that the major ethnic relations project launched during the previous year came to a close. The thrust of the project involved initiating several processes at once through a number of subsidiary projects ("Placement of Estonian and Russian children with families for ongoing and individualized language learning", "Enrolment of non-Estonians in Estonian universities", "Monitoring of the integration process; Government officials in a multicultural society" etc.), which created a completely new quality in the way that nationalities relations are regarded. I believe that through this large project, the Foundation succeeded in creating a well-functioning and professional network of non-profit organizations and individuals that was capable of playing an important part in increasing the cohesiveness of society, and which also should be able to independently ensure the continuation of projects that bring a variety of ethnic groups into closer contact.

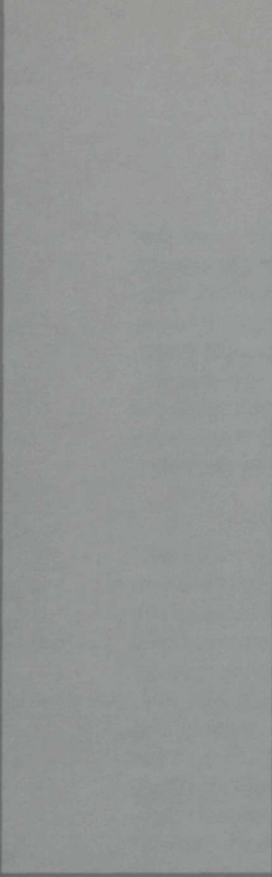
During 1999, the Foundation launched two more programs of considerable size that are based on volunteers: "Teachers for East Virumaa" and "Find the Solutions in East Virumaa". The projects were meant to vitalize a region that is known for its low level of social involvement, high level of unemployment, inadequate language skills, and for its large community of non-Estonians. A good reception was accorded to the country-wide advertising campaign "Lots of Fine People", which presented the variety of peoples living in Estonia.

We believe that we have succeeded in lessening the insecurity of non-Estonians regarding their future, and have also boosted the confidence of Estonians, stimulating all of us to continue to think about the topics of national identity and the preservation of cultural space.

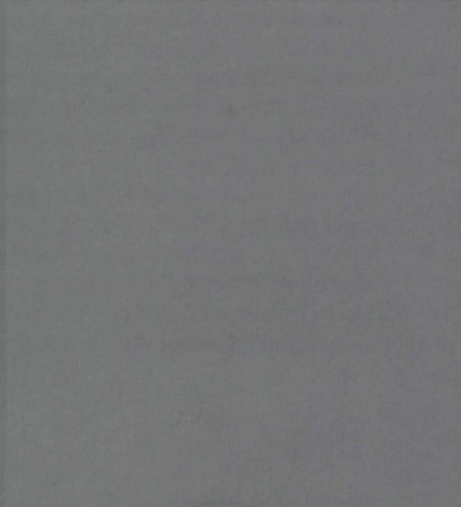

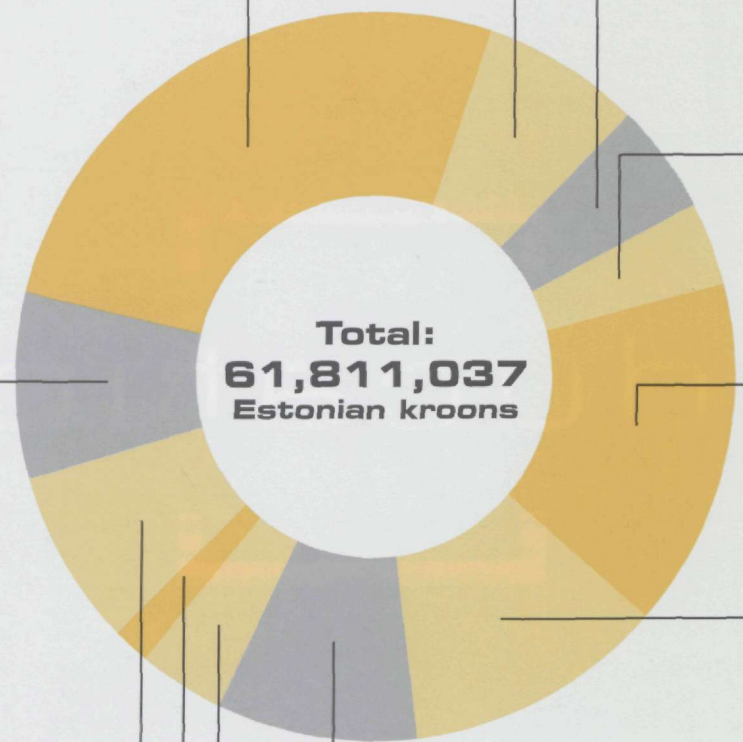


[distribution of open estonia foundation grants for **1999**]

Development program for student governments 539,580

The objective of the program, which was carried out by the Development Center for Schools with Distinction Foundation, was to help young people to gain firsthand knowledge of the way that the principles of democracy function, and to give shape to a democratic environment for learning and development at school.

Core support for the AHHA Science Interest Center 500,000

Thanks to the support that was provided, it was possible to develop and publicize the AHHA Science Interest Center of the University of Tartu throughout the country. Other activities that were carried out included the training of teacher and the establishment of a support group consisting of scientists. An interactive exhibition: "Ahaa - Insects" was arranged in cooperation with the Natural History Museum, London.

Second Stage of the Audit Program for schools "The Quality School of Estonia" 458,100

The aim of the project of the Foundation of Unique Schools and the OEF was to lay the foundation for a modern-day system of quality control implementation and assessment in Estonian schools, in order to increase the ability of educational institutions to compete and adapt, and to make them more accessible to society. Models of controlling quality were implemented in 40 pilot schools throughout Estonia.

Core support for the Center of Continuing Education for Teachers of the Institute of the Open Mind 568,520

The Institute of the Open Mind is an educational institution created by Development Center for Schools with Distinction Foundation for the purpose of providing teachers with supplementary training. 5 training courses were carried out during 1999. The trainers were graduates of courses arranged under the aegis of OEF projects, all of whom have been certified as trainers of teachers.

Core support for the Development Center for Schools with Distinction Foundation 404,240

The Development Center is the partner organization of the Open Estonia Foundation for the purpose of carrying out educational programs and projects. The Foundation was created foremost for the purpose of ensuring that the educational programs of the OEF become independent and continue to develop, without having to rely on support from the Foundation.

The Role of Reading and Writing for Critical Thinking 1,814,000

60 Estonian and Russian speaking teachers received training within the framework of the Network Program, which was launched in 1998. They will be transferring what they have learned to other teachers at the Institute of the Open Mind (at the Center of Continuing Education for Teachers). The objective of the program is to stimulate students and teachers as well to think independently and critically, and to analyze.

Visual Thinking Strategies 396,000

The program relies on research gathered during the span of 20 years, and consists of the development of thinking and communications experience through the observation of works of art. Since 1997, teachers of Estonian schools have been able to avail themselves of the methods that were jointly worked out by scientists at Harvard University and specialists of the Museum of Modern Art in New York.

Media Training in General Education Schools 250,000

The objective is to cultivate critical and knowledgeable media users and practitioners of school media that are appropriate for a democratic school system. Two subprojects were brought to fruition within the framework of the project, which was an initiative of the Foundation: "A Media-focused Training Course and a Collection of Study Materials" and "The Newspaper as part of a Teaching Period".

The "Step by Step" Development Program for Nursery Schools 3,268,800

The "Step by Step" program for educational reform emphasizes the importance of teaching methods that regard the child as client and that prioritize getting family and those close to the child involved in the educational process. Estonian and Russian language kindergartens and schools in the cities of Tartu and Tallinn participated in the five-year program.

The establishment of a CBL (Calculator Based Laboratory) pilot class for the familiarization of new opportunities in school laboratories	284,000
The AHHA Science Center	

The creation of the pilot class pioneered the use of a set of innovative experimental methods based on the use of state-of-the-art technology in Estonian schools, which will serve to support school laboratories and help to eliminate practices of teaching natural sciences that have fallen behind the times.

The Basics of Legal Information (Street Law)	660,000
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"The Basics of Legal Information" project, - an initiative of the Jaan Tõnissoni Institute - is similar to the "Street Law" course that was worked out for US schools and was subsequently adopted around the world. The first task was to bring together a team of authors for the necessary study materials. After participation in international seminars, an analysis was conducted to see how the project could be made to fit into the Estonian system of education.

Debate Program for Estonian Schools	415,100
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The objective of the project, which was carried out by the Estonia Debating Society, was to help develop public speaking skills in Estonian society. The support provided to the project made it possible to arrange an Estonian Debating Championship, a tour of general education schools, a summer camp, and an international tour, and enabled participation in training for public speakers in Prague.

Educational Policy Center	84,500
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The aim of the Center, which was set up as a joint effort of the Ministry of Education, The Education Forum Foundation, The University of Tartu, The Tallinn Pedagogical University and the Tallinn Technical University is to take steps designed to result in educational policy that is based on factual information.

Community School - A Regional Development Center	28,200
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Community education is an educational model that has been broadly applied in Western Europe (especially in the Scandinavian countries) and North America, with the goal of helping regional development through the involvement of learning communities and the mechanism of life-long learning. The goal of this project is to pitch the idea of community education to local administrations and schools in Estonia, through which the concepts of learning societies and life-long learning can be strengthened.

The "Trust Brings Solutions" project for School Psychologists and Social Workers	54,600
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The goal of the project of the Foundation and the Development Center for Schools with Distinction Foundation was to train school psychologists and social workers so that they would have sufficient knowledge of counseling services meant for children, and also of the problems that may need solving. Supplementary training was also provided to form masters and school psychologists.

Newspaper of the Estonian Association of Student Governments (EÕL) "Õpilasteataja" ("The Student Herald")	11,200
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The official periodical publication of the EÕL publicizes the existence of the Association and its activities to all Estonian students, and solicits their active participation in decision making processes in various areas that have to do with the interests of the students themselves.

Magazine of the Development Center for Schools with Distinction Foundation "Kooruke ja Iva"	20,000
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The publication of the Development Center helps to unite students, teachers and all who have an interest in education, providing them with thematic information and new ideas.

Support Program for Higher Education

Total: 2,457,170

Development of a Master's Degree Program in Educational Science at the University of Tartu and the Tallinn Pedagogical University 1,187,000

The primary ideas of the project are: to develop and implement a education curriculum on the Master's Degree level; and to activate schooling on an regular basis at the University of Tartu and the Tallinn Pedagogical University. The curriculum has been internationally acknowledged, is based on contemporary teacher's training paradigms, and is geared to the needs of society.

Core support for the Northern American Universities Information Centers in Tallinn and Tartu 297,000

During 1999, the goal of the Centers was to prepare for their transfer to the administrative jurisdiction of the Library of the University of Tartu, along with the introduction of services on a paying basis. The basic task of the Center is to provide information about university-level education in the USA and Canada - both in terms of studies leading to degrees in those countries, and also as concerns scientific work.

International Summer School "Implementing Open Distance Learning Methods at the University Level" 99,000

One of the primary goals of the summer school conducted by the Tallinn Pedagogical University (June 7-11 and August 23-27) was to teach the faculty members of various universities how to make changes in the way that education is provided and to improve school systems in today's changing society, under circumstances that prioritize the learning process, the quality of education, and the replacement of approaches that placed the teacher in the center of the pedagogical process with approaches that are student-centered.

Development Project for the Tallinn Philosophy Center 124,000

The leitmotif of the Philosophy Center is to bring together Estonia's best lecturers in philosophy, who - in addition to course work at their own universities - could also lecture at partner institutions of higher learning. The support was use for improving the library of the Center and for the purchase of hardware and software. The inter-university Tallinn Philosophy Center has now been launched.

Master's Degree Programs in Public Administration at the University of Tartu 100,500

The objectives of the programs, which were launched in 1998, are to train highly qualified state officials; to prepare lecturers for giving instruction in public administration; to conduct research at institutions of higher education, and to provide state officials with additional education.

Project Competition "Mobility for Young Faculty Members"

The goal of the project competition was to intensify and to increase the frequency of communications between young Estonian lecturers and recognized universities abroad. The competition made it possible to provide young Estonian lecturers with scholarships that gave them hands-on practical experience at universities in other countries (for up to two semesters), and also made it possible to bring acknowledged specialists from universities abroad to universities here.

Specialized studies at the University of Indiana and preparation of projects of cooperation in conjunction with Tartu University

Project competition: "The Child's Worry is Everyone's Concern"

"The Child's Worry is Everyone's Concern" is something that developed as a result of the Street Children Project Competition arranged in 1998 by the OEF. The target group of the competition was children who have been deprived of parental care and are having problems at home and school. The activities of the project include psycho-social and criminal preventive work with children and young people, the creation of a system of caregivers, arranging camps, interest activities, the teaching of methods for coping, the ongoing development of services offered by shelters, and the solving of problems connected with school and home.

The Peace at School Project **100,000**
Estonian 4H, the youth movement "TORE",
and the Estonian Association of Student Self-Governments

The objectives: to influence the microclimate at schools, shaping a positive attitude towards fellow students and towards teachers; to preempt and lessen violence at schools, encouraging youngsters to be more active in determining how things are at school on a daily basis.

A Future Above the Clouds **99,985**
The Paldiski Youth Fund Foundation

A project that is designed to try to prevent criminal behavior. It gave 10-18 year-old members of a group at risk the chance to take part of activities, in order to - with the help of specialists - enhance their social skills and to strive for the status of natural young people with healthy attitudes.

The Little Owl **20,600**
The Christian Home NGO

A project begun by the Tartu Christian Home to seek out and help street children and other children in need of help. One of the objectives of the project was to stimulate schoolchildren to use personal initiative in solving problems.

The Võhma Center for Children and Young People **72,949**
The Võhma Society for the Protection of Children

The activities of the Center, founded in 1998, concentrate on finding things to do for children and youngsters in their free time and to stave off risks, all on the basis of pedagogical and social methods. One of the goals of the center is to provide children with a place to go to.

The Black Sheep **60,000**
The Tallinn City Mission

The project deals with children and young people in general education schools who are socially excluded. The goals are to create support groups for those who have been marginalized and to create an atmosphere that contributes to emotional and intellectual development. One focus was on the strengthening of the ability to communicate and express things and also on helping children and youngsters to fortify their self images.

The Worry of the Child is Everyone's Concern **27,340**
The Vasalemma Parish Government

The goals of the project were to improve the level of ability of rejected children to communicate and fend for themselves on an everyday basis. Intercommunication was taught, and a course was provided on "how to take care of yourself". Children who displayed a penchant for coming to grips with situations and for communicating took part of a "Caregiver's course".

I Help Others in My Age Group **70,000**
The Võrumaa Social Work Center NGO

The aim was to train support providers for all of the counties of Võrumaa with the ability to listen to the problems of their peers and to help them if necessary. Support groups are created for each administrative district to help children who have ended up in conflict situations at home or school.

The Bully **21,625**
The Valgamaa Association
for the Protection of Children

The task that has been set is to prevent criminal behavior among minors with problematic behavior, to psycho-socially help children who are aggressive and cannot restrain themselves, and the parents of such children, and to provide assistance to victims of bullying.

Oliver **19,220**
The Pärnu Family Help Center

Social workers specializing in the care of children in Pärnu arrange hikes for children who have gotten into conflict situations at school or at home, with the aim of helping them to come to terms with their surroundings and of giving the children with meaningful activity during the summer period.

The Rapla Youth Club	53,588
The Art Society of the Rapla Association for Open Education	

The idea was to create the conditions and opportunities for youngsters to be able to set up a club for themselves, so that children from materially disadvantaged families would have things to do in their free time.

An Alternative Route	20,000
The E. Sokolowsky NGO	

The primary objective is to remove conflict-prone 13-16 year-olds in the Vändra area from their everyday environment, in order to get them, with the help of specialists, to adjust their attitudes and behavior for social acceptance. Parents and pedagogues were also provided with supplementary education.

The Kinderstube in Narva Project	50,000
Caritas Estonia	

The "Kinderstube" Child Care Center prevents children from families at risk from ending up on the street. The objective is to compensate for deficiencies in domestic child-rearing and to reinforce the habit of attending school.

Big Brother/Big Sister

The objective of the program, launched in 1997, is to train volunteers for children who are from families at risk and their families. The Support Centers for Children in Tallinn and Tartu are the coordinators for this international program in Estonia. The OEF also provided help to participants from Estonia that enabled them to participate at the International Conference in Budapest. (May 4 - May 10, 1999).

Thanks to the project, Russian-speaking residents of Western Estonia belonging to groups that are socially at risk were provided with basic computer skills and the skills needed for regular use of the Internet.

The "Civic Information" Project Competition

The objective of the Competition was to increase the number of Estonian and Russian language information, self-help, consultation and advice-oriented resources in the Internet on the following topics: citizen's and human rights, consumer protection, conservation of nature, health care and legal aid. The creation of these pages helps to publicize and stimulate the use of the Internet as a conventional media channel.

A Better way to Cope with Life **72,000**

The aims of the project were to raise the awareness of the populace about regarding issues that pertain to counseling services in the city of Tartu and Tartu County, and to create a Home Page that would provide a comprehensive overview of the social sphere in the Tartu area.

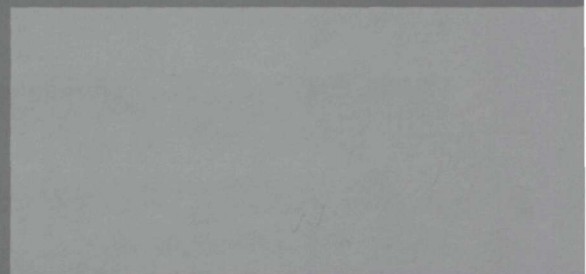
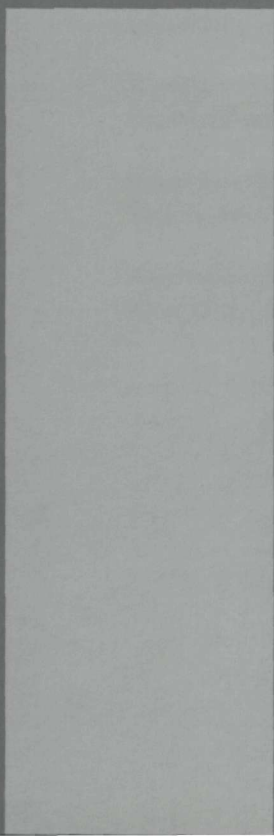

The Association of Estonian Library Workers

The task of preserving materials of national and cultural significance by transferring them to micro-film began in 1998 with the help of the Open Estonia Foundation. In addition to guaranteeing the preservation of the material, this also ensures that the public at large has access to it.

A Seminar for Librarians About the Experiences of the US Library of Congress 38,400

Placement of Russian children with families for individualized and ongoing language learning 560,000

The aim of the project was to facilitate the integration of the non-Estonian part of the population into Estonian society. Family language learning materials were prepared in conjunction with the Foundation for the Integration of Non-Estonians, training was provided for families who hosted the children, and a national system for family language learning was worked out and put to use.

"Treatment of Ethnic Relations in the Media" (a competition for the media) 330,000

The third phase of the "Treatment of Ethnic Relations in the Media" subproject of the major nationalities relations project "The Third Sector in Support of the Integration of Non-Estonians" involved cooperation between journalists of the "Eesti Päevaleht" and "Estonija" newspapers, which entailed reciprocal publication of each others articles up until the end of 1999.

Conference "Cultural Diversity in Estonia: Problems and Solutions" : Tallinn, October 7-10, 1999 100,000

The goal of the conference was to discuss the concept of the multicultural society on an international level, with the goal of bringing Estonians and non-Estonians to the conviction that without a tolerant attitude based on two-way respect in ethnic relations, it is not possible to do anything successfully in Estonia as a territory with a multicultural society.

Supplementary Admission of Non-Estonians into Estonian Universities (University of Tartu and the Tallinn Pedagogical University) 415,880

The goal of the project was to help dismantle barriers that stand in the way of young foreigners who desire to continue their education in the universities of Estonia. A supplementary quota for the admission of students of foreign origin was established by The University of Tartu and the Tallinn Pedagogical University for young people wanting to study public administration and social work.

Language and culture immersion for teachers in East Virumaa of other ethnic backgrounds who teach the Estonian language and Estonian subject matter 150,000

The goals were: to assist in the acquisition of new language and teaching skills, to raise motivation as concerns the Estonian culture and state, to improve Estonian-language abilities, and to learn things about the Estonian country that were missing in the knowledge base of the teachers.

Advertising campaign designed to raise consciousness about the problems of foreigners 101,700

The aims of the campaign, which was carried out by the Faculty of Advertising and Media at the Tallinn Pedagogical University, were to bring the issue of integration before the public, to change attitudes and stereotypes and to create a positive image of foreigners, to publicize arguments in favor of integration, and to create a head start for future campaigns.

Find the Solutions in East Virumaa 127,200

The economic and social circumstances of East Virumaa are characterized by a deepening depression. The goal of the Foundation-initiated project was to transfer know-how and energy back to East Virumaa through educated young people.

Teachers of the Estonian Language for the Schools of East Virumaa 1999/2000 **337,500**

This project was stimulated by the need to improve the Estonian language abilities of young Russians in East Virumaa and to encourage them to participate in the social processes of Estonia. From a broader perspective, this project would bring the Estonian and Russian communities closer together, helping to improve cooperation between them through common undertakings.

Projects of the Open Estonia Foundation for Improvement of the teaching of the Estonian language in East Virumaa **504,095**
The East Virumaa Development NGO

The objective was to bring additional Estonian language teachers to East Virumaa and to provide twenty teachers in Estonian and Russian schools the professional training needed to work out projects designed to foster cooperation between Estonian and Russian schools.

The Music, Arts and Theater Festival "Generation 2000" **40,000**
The Evolvanta NGO

The idea of the Festival that took place in Jõhvi and Kohtla-Järve and brought together Estonians and non-Estonians was to provide a common venue for people active in art, music and theater from East Virumaa and outside the county so that they could gain publicity for themselves and their future plans, and to give the public at large a chance to get acquainted with their work.

Supplementary Civic Education for students of the High Schools of Virumaa **12,911**
The Student Body of the university students of Virumaa

The majority of the high school students in Narva and Rakvere don't really understand what the work of local administrations and state institutions consists of, nor do they have a good understanding of the rights of citizens and aliens. The task of the pilot project is to improve the situation, making theory mesh with the real-life situation in East Virumaa and also on the level of the state.

Computer Center for Young People **188,980**
The East Virumaa Development NGO

The Center - which is basically meant for the young people of Kohtla-Järve and its environs - will offer several things, including training in the use of computers, a chance to interact with each other, and opportunities for intellectual development.

A Good Idea is worth Expressing and Executing - Employment Problems of the Youth of East Virumaa **138,548**
Toila High School

The basis of the project is to seek solutions to employment problems in the County of East Virumaa. Three brainstorming sessions on "How to reduce unemployment among the young in East Virumaa" were carried out at the beginning of the project, involving college students, businessmen, representatives of the public sector, young people without work from East Virumaa and labor resource experts. In part two, supplementary schooling was arranged for young unemployed persons.

Compendium of English-language speeches and articles "Cultural Pluralism in Estonia: Policies and Solutions" **30,600**
The Jaan Tõnissoni Institute

The objective was to publicize to the world the progress of the integration process that has taken place in Estonia during recent years, along with the problems that have cropped up.

Intensive learning of Estonian in a social work study group that uses Russian as its basic language **87,600**
The Rakvere Pedagogical School

The educational process was continued for a year longer than usual in this group in order that students using the Russian language would be able to do better in the study program of the school. An intensive Estonian language course was arranged during the first year, along with additional lessons in Estonian culture, folk culture and history.

Women of Narva leading the Way 25,000

into Estonian Society

The Student Body of the university students of Virumaa

The objective of the project was to make the women of East Virumaa more active and to raise their cultural competence as regards social and political life in Estonia. The undertaking helps to eliminate national and language barriers that keep women from becoming what they could be in Estonia.

Getting the Youngsters off the Streets 8,840

The Youth Center of the City of Narva

The goal of the project was to raise the activity level of young people in the Kiviõli region of East Virumaa and to create the ties that would turn Estonian young people and non-Estonians into friends. The final result was the establishment - with the participation of 30 young persons - of the Kiviõli Youth Center.

The "Lots of Fine People" Advertising Campaign 200,000

The IO Advertising Bureau

The theme of integration was brought into the limelight through a social advertising campaign, the two communities here were brought closer together, and Estonians were warmed to the idea of integration.

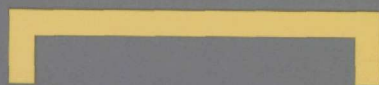
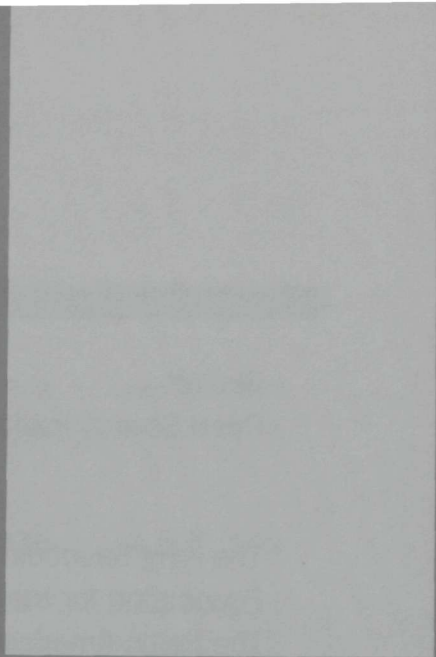


AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Board of Open Estonia Foundation


